#### HOW DO I START?

It can feel difficult to figure out how and what to write at first. But you have to start somewhere!

Have a dedicated place to collect your ideas: a notebook, the notes app on your phone, a moodboard on Pinterest.





### SCRATCHING

Any element of the story can be the first thing to take shape: themes, concepts, images, characters or lines of dialogue. Acclaimed

dancer and choreographer Twyla Tharp calls this initial phase of discovery: "scratching."

Check out what Twyla Tharp has to say about her creative process of "scratching"

Once you have scratched at an idea, found a toehold, or discovered the beginnings of a thread, follow that thread! See where it goes!

When "scratching,"
trust your gut, your
heart, whatever is
exciting to you-follow that!
Just stick with it until
your play reveals itself
to you.

## YPiP'S SIMPLE RULES

Start scratching for your ideas! There are just a few elements to remember when writing your play for YPiP.

These criteria are not meant to stifle your creativity; they are meant to measure the plays fairly!

1.

No more than four characters and no narrators.

2.

2000 word limit.

around 10 double-spaced

pages or 10 minutes of

performance time

3.

Original works only.
No adaptations of
TV shows, movies,
books, etc.
